Today's Word from God: Our Father in Heaven Protects His Children by Giving His Holy Angels Charge Over Them. We live in "a time of trouble" (Dan. 12:1), in the midst of great tribulation; for Satan and his wicked angels have been thrown out of heaven and have come down to earth *"in great wrath,"* with woeful *"temptations to sin"* and with constant accusations (Rev. 12:8-12; Matt. 18:7). Even so, we are encouraged by the presence and protection of St. Michael and the holy angels, whom God sends to help us in the strife (Dan. 10:11-13). By "the authority of his Christ," His holy angels guard and keep us in body and soul. These heavenly servants of God preserve His human messengers on earth, the ministers of "the blood of the Lamb," against all the power of the enemy; for by "the word of their *testimony*," the Church is saved and the devil is defeated (Rev. 12:10–11; Luke 10:18–19). By their preaching and Baptism of repentance, the old Adam and the old evil foe are "drowned in the depth of the sea" (Matt. 18:6); and as God raised Christ Jesus from the dead, so are His people delivered and raised from the dust of the earth through the forgiveness of their sins (Dan. 12:1-3).

Grace Notes: A The Order of Service, Part 14—Preface, Sanctus: Drawn toward the gifts of Jesus' body and blood, our hearts are lifted up in thanksgiving and praise as we anticipate the reception of the gifts that carry with them our redemption. The Sanctus, meaning "holy," brings together the song of heaven's angels in adoration of the Holy Three in One and the acclamations of Palm Sunday: "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest." (Adapted from Didache: A Narrative Commentary on the Divine Service by Rev. John Pless. Used by permission.) **Stewardship Corner:** Jim Elliot, a missionary martyred for his faith, made this profound statement: "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose." Through faith, we understand the truth in this statement. All of our worldly possessions will at some time be taken from us. We will lose them during our lifetimes, or they will be taken away at death. They cannot be kept forever. However, we have the opportunity to use our material possessions in service to the Lord by giving to those in need and to God's Church. What we give through faith will provide spiritual dividends for us as well as for others. As Paul wrote, "The gifts you sent are a fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God" (Philippians 4:18). In verse 17, he wrote, "Not that I am looking for a gift, but I am looking for what may be credited to your account." What we do in Christ's name for Him, we cannot lose.

Today's Mission Focus Offering will go to our District's 1-1-1 initiative to supplement mission funding. We are receiving a special offering and invite each worshiper to give \$4 (\$1 for every 1 worshiper for every 1 week of the month). What you choose to give is of course between you and the Lord. The point is to call us as God's people to recognize how richly blessed we are, and to share from those blessings toward the spreading of the Gospel of Christ.

In its meeting Wednesday night, the Church Council voted to distribute \$11,000 from last year's earnings from our endowment fund as follows: The Lutheran Church of Venezuela (*Iglesia Luterano Venezuela*, or ILV) – \$6,000
 The English District (and through it, the Synod) – \$2,000; *Worship Anew* – \$2,000 *Issues, Etc.* – \$1,000. We are grateful to God for this blessing and the opportunity to use it in His mission. The Council was able to hear a presentation on the ILV and the dire circumstances it faces in Venezuela (including pastors who are receiving no wages), and it is our prayer that this gift will alleviate some of that suffering and support the ILV in her mission and ministry.

Bible Study Update: We have resumed both our Sunday morning and Wednesday morning Bible classes for those who can safely participate. *The Sunday morning class* begins at 9:00 AM in the fellowship hall. *The Wednesday morning class,* also in the fellowship hall, begins at 10:00

AM as we continue in our study of Genesis. We are practicing social distancing and encourage participants to wear face coverings. No coffee or refreshments will be served, but participants are welcome to bring their own. Please join us in this important component of our life together as the family of our Father, as we share together and grow in His Word.
